

What's an Encuentro?

Loco for Love Encuentros bring musicians, dancers, storytellers, scholars, and invited observers (members of the general public) together, in the same room, to explore specific aspects, themes, or eras in Florida history from a variety of different perspectives.

Encuentros offer a flexible format – part lecture-demo, part jam session, part miniconcert, part Q&A, part rehearsal, part performance, part sneak peek behind the scenes, part scholarly talk, part think tank, part time travel – for encountering history and making discoveries about music, dance, drama, and diversity.

Why is Theater with a Mission (TWAM) hosting these Encuentros?

Florida history is packed with perspectives that we sorely need today – perspectives on how past Floridians have wrestled with urgent questions about race relations, public health, cultural exchange, regime change, and civil liberties.

TWAM has found that mixing music, dance, drama, storytelling, and scholarship offers a powerful combination for bringing history to life, helping people today to see, hear, feel, and embody experience from the past.

Since Florida became US Territory in 1821, and since FSU scholar Wiley L. Housewright published a groundbreaking *History of Music & Dance in Florida*, 1565-1865 in 1991, there are two historical milestones to map out themes for these Encuentros.

What themes will Loco for Love Encuentros explore?

To explore the 200th anniversary of Florida becoming US Territory and the 30th anniversary of Dr. Housewright's *History of Music & Dance in Florida*, we are targeting these themes for Encuentros this spring:

- Native Florida
 - exploring Native American music, dance, storytelling, and cultural presence in Florida
- Black Florida
 - exploring music, dance, storytelling, and hidden histories of African presence in Florida
- Florida during the 1600s
 - exploring music, dance, and drama in Florida during the late Renaissance and Early Modern eras (late 1500s and 1600s)
- Florida during the 1700s
 - exploring music, dance, and hidden histories in Florida during the Baroque era
- Florida during the early 1800s
 - exploring music, dance, and social practices in Florida during the Regency or early Territorial era.

One advantage of the Encuentro format will be sparking conversations that travel across these timelines and themes.

How will these Encuentros work?

All Encuentros will take place in controlled-access spaces; everyone must show a negative COVID test dated that day to enter. To accommodate presentations of different sizes, spaces rented include indoor and outdoor venues.

We expect that each encounter will last about 90 minutes, featuring 1 or 2 selections by musicians, 1 or 2 selections by dancers, 1 or 2 stories, short contributions by 1 or 2 scholars, plus conversation among the musicians, dancers, storytellers, scholars, and invited observers.

In the two weeks before Loco for Love, Theater with a Mission (TWAM) will host Zoom meetings to gather the principal presenters for each Encuentro. These Zoom meetings will use prompts that TWAM has prepped to establish a provisional sequence of presentations for each Encuentro.

During Loco for Love weekend, videographers will capture encounters, so that people can profit by this multicultural and multidisciplinary exploration of Florida's history in other times and places (enhanced by accessibility features). We hope musicians, dancers, storytellers, and scholars will attend Encuentros where they are not principal presenters, to cross-pollinate Q&As for each encounter.

Within 30 days after Loco for Love, all presenters will receive stipends.

When and where will Loco for Love's Encuentros on music, dance, & diversity in Florida history take place?

These Encounters will take place on March 5-6, 2022, in Tallahassee, Florida, following this roughly chronological schedule:
